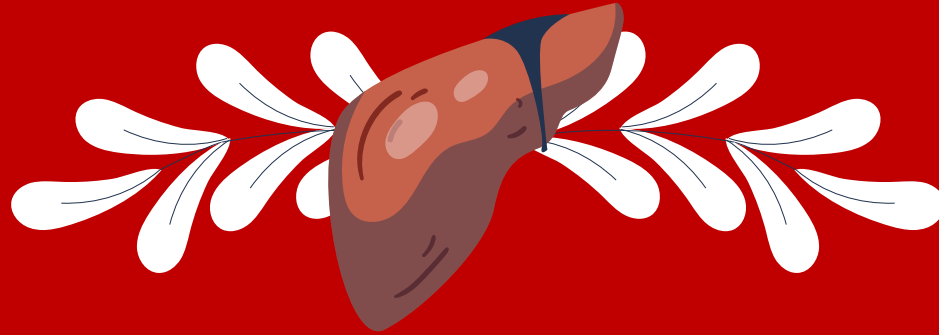


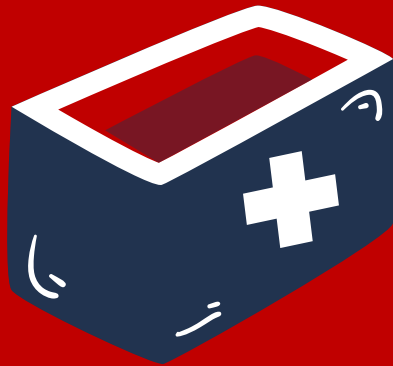
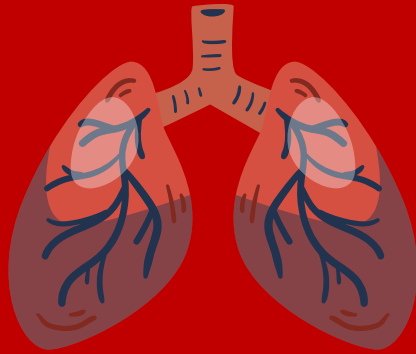
What is Organ Donation?

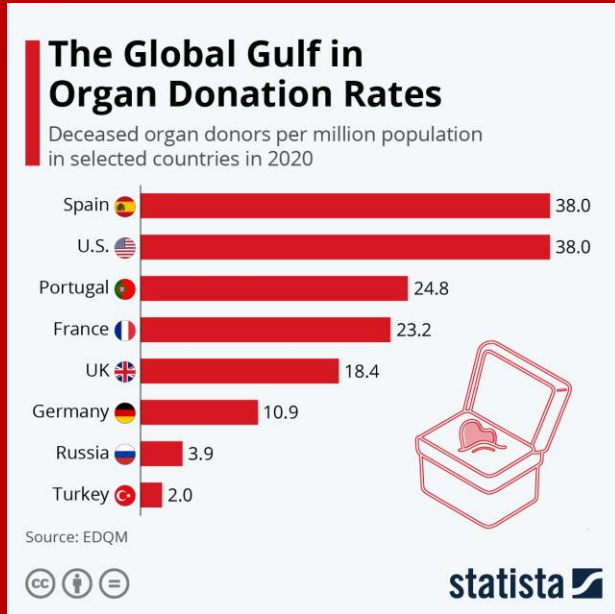

WHO CAN BE AN ORGAN DONOR?



A DECEASED person of any age and blood group can donate an organ provided:

- ❖ The person is declared brain dead &
- ❖ The person's near relatives give consent for donation

A LIVING person, over the age of 18 yrs can donate his/her organ to a near relative or anyone else out of natural love & affection



WHO CANNOT BE AN ORGAN DONOR?

Individuals with the following **MEDICAL** conditions cannot donate their organs:

- ❖ HIV, Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C, STD, generalized infection and septicemia (Pneumonia, TB, etc.).
- ❖ Any kind of skin infection, malignancy, and having evidence of skin cancer.

LIVE

Can be made to near relatives and non-relatives solely out of love and affection

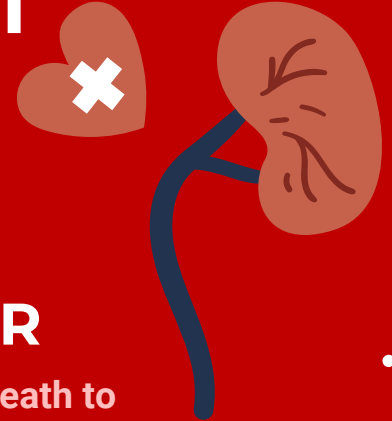
Organs & Tissues - Blood, 1 kidney, part of liver, part lung, intestine, pancreas & bone marrow

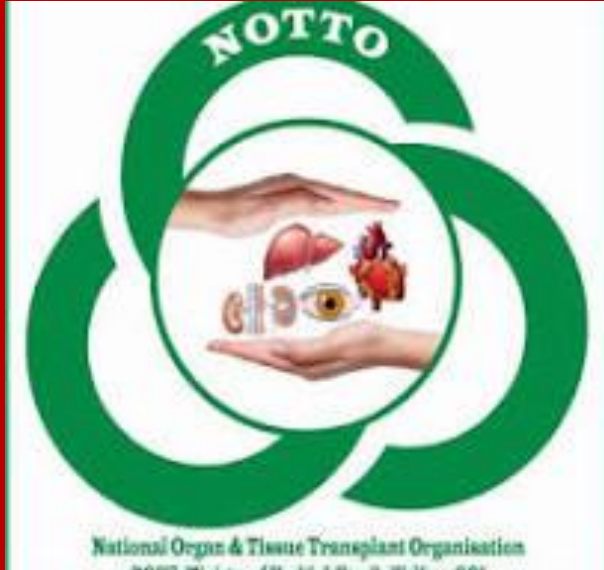


CADAVER

Can be made after death to an unknown person who is on government organ donation wait list

Organs & Tissues - Kidneys (2), liver, lungs (2), heart, corneas (2), skin, pancreas, intestines, hands & face

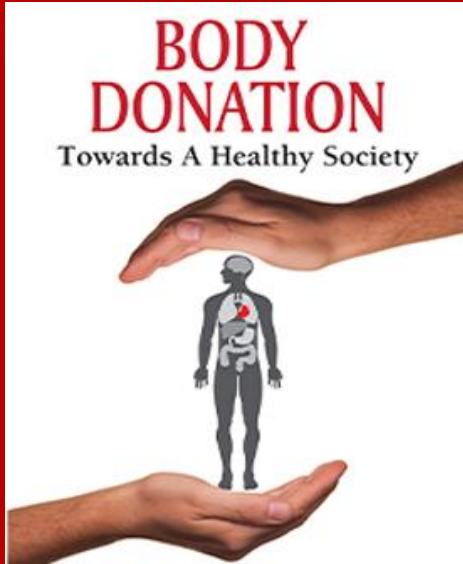

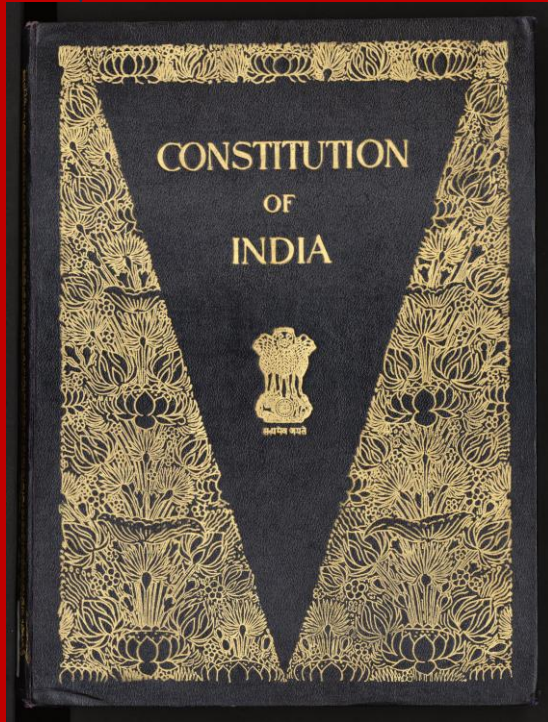


Art. 21:

No person shall be deprived of his life or personal liberty except according to procedure established by law.

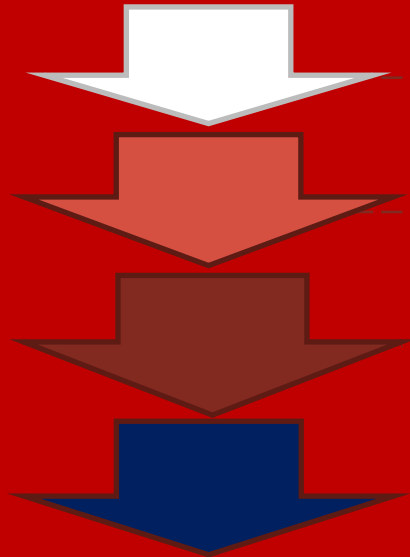


Art. 21: Right to Life

Central v State Authority for health

Article 246: Central Government has no authority to make Law, Rules & Regulation in respect of health matter.

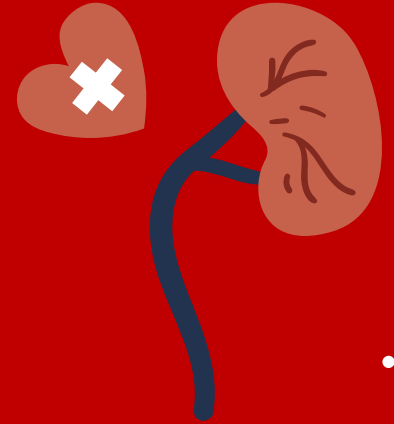

Rules made in 1995 and amended in 2014



OBJECT -1

Enacted to provide a proper system for removal, storage and transplantation of human organs & tissues for therapeutic purposes



OBJECT -2

Enacted to prevent commercial dealings in human organs

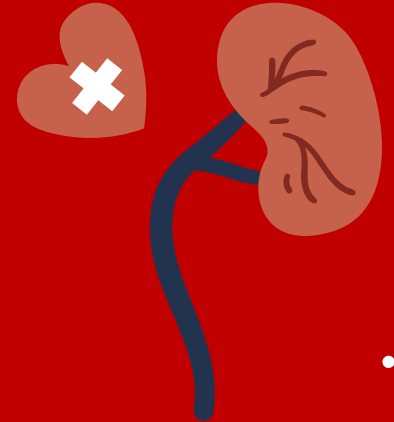

Question of Law?

Only question of law is interpreted & decided by court
Art. 14 & 226



Question of Fact?

Question of fact is NOT decided by the HIGH Court or Supreme Court

Authority Under THOTA ACT 1994 -1

SECTION 2 (d) : “Brain-stem death” means the stage at which all functions of the brain-stem have permanently and irreversibly ceased and is so certified under **sub-section (6) of section 3**;

AUTHORITY UNDER THOTA ACT 1994 Section 3 (1)	Removal before death - Live donor
Section 3 (2)	Removal after death – Deceased donor. Consent in writing before death
Section 3 (3)	Removal after death – Consent in writing by near relatives of deceased person
Section 3 (4)	Removal by Registered Medical Practitioner (RMP) only
Section 3 (5)	RMP must satisfy that person is brain–steam dead and life is extinct
Section 3 (6)	Certificate by Board of Medical Experts – (i) RMP In-charge (ii) Independent RMP (iii) Neurologist & Neurosurgeon OR Surgeon, Physician, Anesthetist or Intensivist (iv) RMP treating person




Provision Under THOTA ACT 1994 -2

Section 4	No removal if organ or body required for any investigation
Section 5	Organ removal from unclaimed body only after 48 hours of no claim
Section 6	Medico-legal case – Removal after satisfying that body or organ is not required
Section 9 (1) Restriction & Removal	Approval for near relative donation & Transplantation
Section 9 (1A)	If donor or recipient Foreign nationals & near relative approval of authorization committee necessary – If recipient foreign national & Donor Indian no approval given
Section 9 (1B)	Minor under 18 can not donate while live
Section 9 (1C)	Organ of mentally challenged person can not be taken
Section 9 (3)	Non related donation by reason of affection or attachment or any other special reason
Section 9 (3A)	Swap transplant between near relative possible

Section 9 5)	Authorization committee approves application for live donation after inquiry

Section 11	Removal & Transplantation for <u>Therapeutic</u> purpose only
Section 12	Doctor must explain effect of donation and transplantation
Section 13	Appropriate Authority to approve, reject & renew hospital license – Transplantation and/or retrieval
Section 13A	Advisory Committee to advise Appropriate Authority (AA)
Section 13 B/C/D	Power of AA / National Network / National Registry of Donor and Recipient

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Provision Under THOTA **Rules** 2014 -1



Section 3	Living person can authorize removal for therapeutic purpose in form 1, 2 and 3
Section 4	Appropriate authority / Government department maintain list of expert Doctors
Section 5 (1) Duties of RMP	Shall ascertain after certificate of brain death ...
(a)	Weather pledging is done by deceased person while he was alive
(b)	If no pledge – ask near relative option to approve or decline – Approval in Form 8 or 9
(c)	Inform the authorized team for removal of organ
5 (2)	Applied to the hospitals which is not registered under the Act & Rules



Provision Under THOTA **Rules** 2014-2

Section 5 (3) Must satisfy-	Before removing organ from LIVING DONOR
(a)	Side effects are explained and Authorization given in Form 1 – relative, 2 – spouse or 3 non relative
(b)	Physical and mental evaluation is done
(c)	Joint application in form 11, approval given by appropriate authority in Form 19 and Near relationship and documents verification is done by appropriate authority - APPLICATION IN FORM -1
(d)	Same verification for Spouse relationship – APPLICATION IN FORM 2
(e)	Same verification for Non related – APPLICATION IN FORM 3
(f)	Foreign national approval of authorization committee
(g)	No approval in case of minor unless it is rare case with reason in writing



Provision Under THOTA **Rules** 2014-3

Section 5 (4)	RMP Must satisfy
(a)	Donor has given written consent in presence of two person before death
(b)	Donor relatives have given consent in FORM 8
(C)	All members of board of medical expert has signed FORM - 10
(d)	In case of child - All members of board of medical expert has signed FORM - 10 And parents or near relative authorized by parents have signed FROM -8



Provision Under THOTA **Rules** 2014-4

Section – 6	Medico Legal case – inform police, remove organ without compromising investigation and request postmortem officer to remain present
Section -7 (1)	Medical Practitioner treating patient shall not be part of Authorization committee
Section – 7 (2)	No approval if foreign national is recipient and Indian citizen in donor and non related
Section 7 (3) – approval – NON RELATED	Examine – no commercial transaction, link between two, reason for donation and documents , photos , agent not involved, respective financial status, Donor is not a drug addict, near relative of donor is interviewed and made aware of donation intention etc.
Section (4)	Swap donation between near relative only
Section – 8	Removal and translation in only registered hospital or retrieval center
Section 9	Cost of cadaver/ donor body maintenance , retrieval of organ, transportation and preservation will not be born by DONOR family – but by recipient, hospital, government, non government or society as decided by the STATE GOVERNMENT
Section 10	Living donor must make joint application in form, 11 with form 1,2 or 3 and approval in form 18

Provision Under THOTA Rules 2014-5

Section 18 – process in case of Near Relative	Grand mother, father, mother, father, brother , sister, son, daughter, grandson & grand daughter over the age of 18
Section 18 (1)	(i) Relationship documents – Birth certificate, marriage certificate, other relationship certificate from Tehsildar/ sarpanch / similar authority for family tree or Election card / Addhar card (ii) Ration card, voters card, passport, driving license , PAN card, Bank account, family photos,
Section 18 (2)	If relationship NOT established then DNA and further test of parents / relatives
Section 18 (5)	How to evaluate spouse living donation
Section 18 (6)	Authority to ask for more documents and evidence
Section 19 – NON RELATED	Only authorization committee give approval
Section 20	Foreigner – NOC in form 21 from Embassy and confirmation of relationship
Section 21	Personal interview of living donor and video tape



Provision Under THOTA **Rules** 2014-6

Section - 23	Decision of Authorization committee – approval or reject with reason in writing and subject all positive test and evaluation . Complete all forms, video recording, expedite decision with 24 hours of meeting and decision on web site and notice board but keep identity hidden.
Section - 24	Registration of hospital or Tissue Bank
Section - 25	Renewal of hospital or Tissue Bank
Section - 26	Condition for Grant or renewal of Hospital Organ Transplantation
Section – 27	Condition for Grant or renewal of retrieval center
Section - 28	Condition for Grant or renewal of Tissue Bank
Section 29 -	Qualification and Role of Transplant Coordinator – Graduate in Medicine, Nurse, Social worker, Psychiatry, Sociology, social science or public health – Encourage family to Donate and <u>coordinate process of Donation & Transplantation</u>
Section 30	Advisory committee to advise appropriate authority

ORGAN DONATION & TRANSPLANT

LIVE

Only possible between close relatives and non related can donate provided it is out of love and affection

CADAVER

1. Organ Allocated by SOTTO as per the waiting list and emergency of the patient

ORGAN DONATION & TRANSPLANT PROCESS

LIVE

1. Contact licensed hospital with live donor
2. Undergo necessary tests
3. Provide identity, prove relationship to donor & make an application for transplant in prescribed forms and provide supporting documents
4. Hospital and/or State Authorisation Committee gives approval or refusal for transplant
5. Upon approval, transplant operation is conducted

ORGAN DONATION & TRANSPLANT PROCESS

CADAVER

1. Register with licensed hospital
2. Hospital will register patient with SOTTO according to type of organ and blood group
3. Organ allocated as per organ match and number on waiting list
4. Wait list – State -> Regional -> National -> Foreign nationals

Problem & Challenges -1



1.	Center v State jurisdiction
2.	1994 to 2014 – Decentralize
3.	2014 to present – Centralized – One nation – One Policy
4.	Domicile v Resident Terms
5.	No procedural manuals / Training / Legal expert to assist in the interpretation to Authorization committee members, medical and para medical professionals and Transplant coordinators
6.	Every state and hospital have made different interpretation
7.	From 2014 onwards – Public v Private hospitals clash
8.	No National portal for organ wait list
9.	Transplant Coordinators Roles and Duty – Medical, Physiological and Legal
10.	FORMS – Does not collect detail information of donor and recipient
11.	Medical Professionals try to interpreted law and no lawyers appointed or consulted





Problem & Challenges -2



11.	Government schemes / Yojana / Train discount not made aware to patients
12	No system established or USED for verification of documents for Indian citizen
13.	Very poor system for verifying foreign donor and recipient relationship & documents
14.	Form 21 –NOC and confirmation of relationship from embassy / consulate
15.	Living donor face most difficulties in proving relationship
16.	Rule 14 – verification of domicile / resident by Tehsildar or any other appropriate authority
17.	Rule 18 - All documents asked including DNA test in all cases for living donation
18.	NOC asked from husband / spouse when donating to her relative
19.	No mention of OCI Card Holder Living in India or Abroad
20.	State by state different allocation system and points system
21.	No development of National Portal under section 32
